Young people involved in Reach Out! made a short film to ensure that all of the staff at the Trust heard your important messages:

" We want to be involved in decisions that are made about us "

"It is important that social workers have a good sense of humour to make us laugh"

"We want to have a social worker that stays with us for a long time"

"Social workers make a huge difference to a child's life, they are very important to us"

"You should talk to us more"

"It isn't easy to open up to professionals and it takes time for us to share how we feel"



Children and young people who took part received a £10 gift card of their choice as a thank you for sharing their views and ideas. Thank you again to everyone who took part.

How have your views made a difference?

To help us get things right we need to know from you what is going well and what could be better.

Over the past year we have asked you to share your views, comments and ideas in lots of ways. It has been amazing, and so important, to hear from so many of you.

You told us...

It was important and special that all children and young people looked after and care leavers should receive a birthday card from their social worker or personal advisor.

We listened...

All of you should have received a card from your social worker or personal advisor throughout the past year. We hope you enjoy receiving your cards.

You told us...

Some of you didn't know the name of your IRO or learning advocate.

We listened...

Young people came up with the idea for a 'Hello' postcard that social workers can give to their children and young people to ensure they know their name, what they do and how they can be contacted. 'Hello' postcards were then created for IROs and learning advocates to ensure you all know who they are and how you can contact them.

You told us...

Some of the promises in your Pledge should change and be things that are more important to you. We listened...

A new set of promises have been made to you and all of our children and young people looked after. See page 1 to see the new promises.

You told us...

You want to have social workers that stay with you for a long time and you want your social workers to take you out so they can get to know you. **We listened...**

In our Pledge, we have now promised to make sure your social worker spends time with you to get to know you and understand you. We have also promise not to change your social worker unless it is absolutely necessary. If this happens we will tell you why.

You told us...

Reach Out! wanted to have more opportunities to meet with other young people looked after from across Berkshire to share experiences and work together to improve the services you all receive. **We listened...**

Members of Reach Out! have taken part in several activities that provided them with the opportunity to meet up with other young people, share experiences and have fun.

You told us...

Some of you have told us in your 'My Review...My Views' form that you either don't know what your care plan is. Some older children also have not received a copy of their care plan or pathway plan. **We listened...**

When you complete a form, we will now be writing to you to let you know that we are listening to you. We will also be making sure you know what your plan is and that children receive a copy of their plan.

You told us...

To help you stay fit and healthy you would like to access free leisure activities. Some of you also felt that being able to swim is a life skill so all children looked after should know how to swim.

We listened...

Very soon you will be able to access a range of local leisure activities which includes swimming lessons as part of what we call the 'Leisure Offer' you can find out more on page 7.

You told us...

You want to know more about why you are being looked after.

We listened...

We will make sure your social workers explain to you (even younger children) why you are being looked after.



My Foster Story

A group of children aged 5 to 12, (both children looked after and Slough foster carer's children) spent a busy two days making characters and writing a story to make an animation called 'My Foster Story'.

The animation shares a story of a younger child's memory and feelings of coming in to care.

Children received a special certificate and gift for all their hard work in making the animation.

Your animation will be shown to the adults (carers, social workers and IROs) who support and care for you and will help them to understand how some children feel when they come in to care.

It has also been shown on social media to help to promote the importance of foster carers.

Well done to all of the children who took part.





IN OUR SHOES

'In Our Shoes' is a workshop created and delivered by young people and Sharon, our participation officer.

Young people involved in Reach Out! told us that they wanted to get involved in training the professionals who support and care for Slough's children looked after.

So, they created 'In Our Shoes' to ... " help adults gain a better understanding of who we are, what is important to us and to hear directly from us about our experiences of being looked after".

As well as running each session, young people have also made a short film to share their experiences of being looked after.

Young people delivered their first workshop to a group of Slough foster carers and it is now part of the Fostering Service's annual training programme, yay!

Here is what foster carers shared about the workshop:

"I enjoyed everything. It was engaging, powerful and very valuable"

"It was very thought provoking. Well done to the young people"

"It was outstanding, well done"

"So insightful"

As well as carers, young people will get involved in delivering 'In Our Shoes' to lots of others professionals including social workers, personal advisors and learning advocates.

Being part of Reach Out! is not all about meetings. It also offers children and young people a chance to get involved in other activities such as interview panels, attending national events for children looked after and care leavers and fun projects.

Sharing ideas for a better health services

The CQC, which stands for Care Quality Commission, came to speak to the Reach Out! group to find out what they thought about the health services they receive. An inspector, called Becky, heard directly from the group. Here are some of the important things they shared:

- health appointments were not always 'private' when the foster carer and social worker were also present.
- having advanced notice of the questions asked during assessments would help young people prepare.
- we should have more choice about where our health assessments would take place or the gender of the clinician; school or home were not always the best place for them and one person suggested it might be a good idea to offer the option of a male clinician.
- Lynne, the specialist nurse, attends our Reach Out! meetings to find out how things could be improved for us. Lynne also knows and understands our needs.
- We like our health passports although feel that more specific details about their health could be included.

All of the feedback will help the CQC understand what services are meeting the needs of children and young people and what could be improved.

Well done everyone who took part.

Youth Loneliness

Two charities (Priority 1-54 and Vincent Dance Theatre) worked with Children in Care Councils from across the South East to explore what can cause youth loneliness and share ideas on solutions. Young people from Slough, Windsor & Maidenhead and Bracknell had the opportunity to share their thoughts on what youth loneliness looks like, how does it make young people feel and does social media make young people more or less lonely?

Young people were also asked *"If you were in charge, what would you do to make young people feel less lonely in your school or community?"* One idea Reach Out! shared was to "Redevelop the youth facilities in Slough as we used to have youth centers, youth bus and Slough Young People's Center"

All of the young people's ideas and thoughts will help to create a set of creative resources that will be used in schools and youth groups to explore the subject of youth loneliness with other young people and provide them with support. Well done Reach Out!



Young people helped recruit two new senior managers to the Trust

Young people have been busy helping the Trust to recruit an Assistant Director of Quality, Improvement, Practice and Performance and a Director of Operations.

It is so important that you are given opportunities to choose the right people who are responsible for making decisions about the services you receive. Young people spent two days interviewing candidates and received a gift voucher of their choice as a thank you for all their hard work.

If you are interested in being part of an interview panel we would love to hear from you.

What do some of the words on this page mean?

Director and Assistant Director - these are people who are in charge of the services you receive as a child looked after or care leaver. They are also responsible for your social workers and personal advisors.

Candidates - candidates are new people that would like to come and work at the Trust. These are the people you interview.

Interview panel - this can be several people (young people and adults) that meet together to interview each candidate. When you take part in an interview panel you would ask candidates questions that would help you find out if they have the right skills and experience to do the job.

'Your Life, Your Care' Bright Spots survey

Thank you to all of you who took part in this survey. You shared lots of things that have helped understand what is good and what could be better...here are some of the similar things that you all shared.

What do you feel is good?

- ★ All of you know who your social worker is.
- ★ Nearly all of you trust your social worker.
- ★ All of you aged 8 to 18 know you can speak to your social worker on your own.
- ★ Nearly all of you aged 11 to 18 find it easy to get in touch with your social worker.

What do you feel could be better?

- ★ Some of you feel having a pet would make care better.
- ★ Some of you want to know more about why you are being looked after.
- ★ Some of you want to see your family more.
- ★ Some of you do not feel involved in the decisions that are made about you.

On page 4 of your newsletter you can read about how your views have been listened to. Remember to talk to your carer and social worker about things that are important to you such as wanting a pet or wanting to see your family members more - it is really important that you share how you feel.

If you feel that your views are not being listened to remember you can speak to your IRO. They are also here to listen to you and to support you!



Some great news...FREE leisure activities!

Young people have been involved in developing what we call a 'leisure offer' with the Trust and Slough Borough Council.

What do we mean when we say 'Leisure Offer'? Well...basically, young people felt that you should have access to a range of free or discounted leisure activities.

To help decide what activities should be offered, you had the opportunity to share with us what leisure activities you like. For children looked after the top activity was swimming and for care leavers it was using the gym.

Some children and young people had the opportunity to go swimming or ice-skating for free during the summer holidays. Young people also shared some feedback about why they didn't use their vouchers...

"The voucher would have been more useful if it had a free taster session for the gym"

"Didn't use my voucher for swimming as I can't swim"

"A lot of care leavers feel isolated, it is great that we've been given this voucher but I'm not going to go on my own. We need someone to go with" One thing that was also important for some of you was learning to swim. It was felt was that being able to swim is a life skill and all children looked after should be able to swim before they leave care.

We listened to all of your feedback and Reach Out! have had lots of talks with managers both at the Trust and Slough Borough Council to agree what activities should be in the Leisure Offer and we are very excited to share with you that.....

Slough's children looked after and care leavers now have FREE access to a range of leisure activities that will not only be lots of fun but will keep you healthy.

BERKSHIRE CICC ACTIVITY DAY

Members of Reach Out! took part in a joint activity day with 30 other young people who are members of children in care councils from Windsor & Maidenhead, Wokingham, Reading, Bracknell and West Berkshire.

Young people had requested an opportunity to meet with other children in care councils to share their experiences and find out what decisions and projects they get involved in in their areas.

Young people took part in some fun activities to share their views and thoughts about myths of being in care as well as a steel pan workshop and a digital workshop run by Three Mobile.

Two members of our Reach Out! group also gave a presentation about Slough's children in care council to all of the young people who took part in the day and they were amazing!

As well as attending your Child Looked After review, don't forget that you can also share your views using your My Review...My Views on-line form.

Go to your age group below to find out more about the form you can use!

Aged 4 to 7...



A paper form has been created for children aged 4 to 7 as you've told us that you find it

easier to express how you are feeling through drawings. You will receive your form in the post before your Looked After Review to give you plenty of time to go

through it and share how you feel.

Aged 8 to 15...



You all have the opportunity to use the on-line My Review...My Views form to share

how you are feeling. We have listened to you and improved the form by asking more relevant questions and reduced the number of questions so it takes less time to complete.

Before your next Looked After Review meeting you will receive a set of instructions on how to use the form which also includes your own unique 'username' and details about how to log on to the form.

The format for your username is: initials/month of birth/ year of birth i.e. ssdecember2009.

Animations

When you click 'finish' at the end of your form, it is sent to your Independent Reviewing Officer (IRO) so they know how you are feeling before each of your review meetings.

Reach Out! is the name chosen by children and young people for your Children in Care Council in Slough.

Become a member of a Reach Out!

You can attend a Reach Out! forum from the age of 11. Don't' worry if you are younger as there will be other activities that you too can get involved in.

Young people meet up regularly, during the evenings and school holidays, in The Chat Room at St Martin's Place in Slough to look at what is good or not so good about the services you receive.

The groups also discuss issues (young people call these 'Hot Topics') that are affecting children looked after or care leavers and share ideas on what could be done to make things better for you all.



Being part of Reach Out! is not all about meetings You can get involved in other fun activities such as:

Interviews - you get to be on interview panels to recruit people who want to work for the Trust. This could be for new social workers, IROs, personal advisors or managers.

Training staff and carers - you can be involved in training those that care and support you such as foster carers and social workers.

Projects - you can get involved in projects like creating animations.

Consultations - you can get involved in different consultations with teams across children's services where we need your expert advise on, for example, how to improve resources (booklets, leaflets) for new children and young people coming in to care.

Volunteering - being a member of Reach Out! is volunteering but there are other events and activities young people have volunteered at such as your celebration event. Older young people have volunteered at different events to help the Trust to recruit new foster carers. One young person was the 'voice-over' for a radio advert and was an absolute star.

National events - you get the opportunity to meet up with other young people from across the UK at events such as the All Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) for Looked After Young People .

You don't need to be involved in a Reach Out! forum to take part in these extra opportunities.

Being a member of Reach Out! means you also get to represent the views of Slough's children looked after and care leavers at something called the 'Joint Parent Panel' which is sometimes shortened to JPP.

The Joint Parent Panel is a group of top managers from the Trust, Slough Borough Council as well as elected council members whose job it is to make important decisions about the services for children looked after and care leavers.

Young people share what the Trust and Slough Borough Council are doing well and what it could improve or change for all children looked after and care leavers.

By getting involved you have the opportunity to:

- ✓ Have a say on the issues that matter to you, be listened to and make a difference.
- ✓ Meet the professionals who can make a change.
- ✓ Get involved in different groups, forums and other activities like interviewing staff, making films and animations.
- ✓ Help Slough Children's Services Trust make services better for your future.
- ✓ Make new friends and have fun.



- ★ You go out together for meals and other fun activities like bowling.
- ★ We celebrate each others birthdays and have cake. You'll also receive a card and gift voucher.



- ★ When you take part in extra activities such as interview panels you will receive a gift voucher.
- ★ Each year you receive a certificate and gift voucher to say thank you for all your hard work and commitment to Reach Out!
- ★ You build your confidence and self-esteem, teamwork, communication skills and learn lots of new skills that will help you in your future.
- ★ Being part of Reach Out! is a voluntary role and therefore will look great on your CV and college, university or job applications.
- ★ You also get to make some great new friends.

Do you feel you can't say what you want? Do you feel like no one will listen to you?

This can be hard so an **<u>ADVOCATE</u>** could help you.

What is an advocate?

- They listen to you and understand what you are saying.
- They help you get your wishes and feelings heard.
- They make sure that everyone hears what you are saying.

Any child or young person who needs support to represent their views can have an advocate.

Have you thought about whether you would like an independent visitor?

Independent visitors (sometimes also called an IV) are adult volunteers who give their time freely each month to visit a specific child or young person who is looked after. An IV is an independent person who is not paid to visit you. The aim of the independent visitor is to build and develop a trusting and positive relationship with you by providing support for you with any issues you may be finding difficult in your life. Thank you and a big well done to all of you who have got involved in a Reach Out! group, interview panels and all of the other events that have take place this year.

You will plan, budget and agree each monthly visit together, so you will know when your IV will be coming to see you next and what activity or hobby you will be doing. An IV could:

- Support you in developing your skills and interests.
- Help you to become more confident.
- Someone who will support you to build a trusting friendship.
- Help you with school/college projects.
- Someone to go out and have some fun with.
- Support you to attend your CLA Review if you wanted them to.

"I like going out with her. We have been swimming, to the cinema and ice skating. I kept falling over but it was fun"

"I have a good time with my IV. He has helped me to develop my interests"
